
Where we are

- The TVWS pilot is ongoing but winding down, and no new applications are being accepted
- We are now focusing our work on making preparations for implementation of the TVWS framework by the end of this year
- We published our Policy Statement on 12 February
- The Statement confirmed our decision to allow use of TV White Spaces on a licence exempt basis
- The coexistence rules outlined in the Statement are somewhat stricter than those initially proposed in our 2013 consultation, in order to ensure a low probability of harmful interference to existing users

Key findings from the pilot

- White space database contracting and qualification has worked successfully – eight WSDBs successfully completed a rigorous testing programme to qualify for the pilot
- Trials successfully tested a range of devices with a number of databases, for a range of different use cases
- Some further development of devices needed to bring them in line with the framework – although some are likely to continue to need manual configuration
- Coexistence testing the extensive programme of testing gave us a solid evidence base to support the coexistence criteria described in the Statement

Manually configurable devices consultation

- During the pilot, all of the devices required some form of manual configuration
- We consulted in February on proposals to allow manually configurable devices (MCWSDs) on a licensed basis as a transitional arrangement
- We also proposed to review whether the licensing regime is still required after three years
- The consultation closed on April 24 a Statement setting out our decision is planned for later in the summer



TV white spaces - next steps

In the short-term:

- Implement the licence exemption regime
- Contract with and qualify database providers
- If required, put licensing regime in place
- Put in place IS infrastructure for the data exchange between Ofcom and databases

In the longer-term:

- Refinement of the model and calculations
- Overarching review, possibly
 18 months after initial launch
- Consider potential additions to the framework
